Children reunited with their families in 2023

Orphanages provided with individualized coaching in 2023

At the age of 12, Samuel* (name changed for child protection) found himself navigating the unforgiving streets of Nairobi, Kenya. After his parents separated, Samuel and his three siblings were left in the care of their alcoholic father. Eventually, the family was evicted from their home due to the inability to pay rent. While Samuel's siblings decided to live with their grandmother, he chose the harsh reality of street life, neglecting the importance of family bonds to give life on his own a go.

After six months on the streets, the team at Kwetu Home of Peace brought him to their center. However, the pull of the streets proved strong, leading him to run back after just two months. Undeterred, the team at Kwetu tracked him down and, after two months of persistence, successfully brought him back to the center. It marked the beginning of three transformative years for Samuel at Kwetu, where he not only found a safe place to live but also overcame his own struggles with drinking and completed his primary education.

Recognizing the importance of family ties, the Kwetu team began working to reconnect Samuel with his grandmother and family. And in November of 2023, Samuel was reunited with his grandmother!

As Sister Janerose, Kwetu's Director, reflects on Samuel's future, she emphasizes not only his individual progress but also the crucial importance of family. "What I see in his future is a very bright one. He now understands himself and confidently shares his aspirations for the future. He desires to be close to his family, acknowledging the challenges they face. Despite the obstacles, he yearns to be with them." Samuel's transformation from someone who once believed life was better on his own to someone who now wholeheartedly seeks the love and belonging of a family serves as a powerful testament to the redemptive power of familial bonds. We are so grateful to have supported and coached Kwetu through this reunification!

Strengthening Families



Kole District Family Strengthening Initiative



In 2023, we analyzed the baseline assessment we conducted in late 2022 of four villages in Kole District, Northern Uganda and began the design process for a family strengthening initiative. In the coming weeks, we'll be starting Parent Support Groups in the villages, training parents and caregivers on things like basic parenting skills, nutrition, financial literacy, and sanitation and getting people into savings groups!

About Kole District

Kole District is an underserved district in Northern Uganda that still suffers from lingering effects of a 20 year rebel war and the Covid-19 pandemic. Kole District is divided into two areas: Kole North and Kole South. During the rebel war, the people in Kole North were displaced and forced to leave their homes; Kole South served as the host for those who were displaced. Issues of teenage pregnancy, theft, lack of clean water, no sustainable income, high school drop-out rates, and alcoholism are abundant throughout the district. The four villages that were part of the baseline assessment (Adaganii, Amiabil, Akoo, and Atek A) were chosen by the local government as the villages that are most in need.



Key findings from the Baseline Assessment

- 65% of households have a monthly income of less than 50,000 UGX (less than \$14)
- **100%** of households faced at least one month of food shortage during the previous six months (70% faced 3 or more months of food shortage)
- 65-70% of households in some villages have no children attending school regularly
- 79% of households do not have soap for washing hands after using the bathroom

In 2023, alongside our partner Daniel Kaggwa of Alliance for Uganda Without Orphans, we began Trust-Based Relational Intervention® trainings in multiple districts of Uganda. We also fulfilled the requirements for a grant from Orlando Health, officially wrapping up our local work and allowing us to switch to a global focus.

What is Trust-Based Relational Intervention®?

Trust-Based Relational Intervention® is an attachment-based, trauma-informed intervention that is designed to meet the complex needs of vulnerable children. TBRI® is designed to help lead children who have experienced adversity, early harm, toxic stress, and/or trauma towards hope and healing.

"TBRI® is so needed in Uganda. Children in Uganda have been suffering. They go through a lot—because of wars, because of poverty, because of dysfunctional families. It's very important to have these trainings here to help lead people towards healing. I personally have been transformed through TBRI®; I have been healed. We have so many testimonies of children who were abandoned and rejected but have been able to come back and reunite with their own families, with their own caregivers. A senior leader shared that after a training, a local Sunday School Teacher who used to beat children totally changed his teaching and discipline methods. Children who used to be afraid of their teacher are now memorizing and understanding scriptures in a way they couldn't before."


