

Letter from the Executive Director



And those twelve stones, which they took out of the Jordan, Joshua set up at Gilgal. And he said to the people of Israel, "When your children ask their fathers in times to come, 'What do these stones mean?' then you shall let your children know, 'Israel passed over this Jordan on dry ground.'" –Joshua 4:20-22

Our Work

Around the world, there are an estimated **8 million children** living in orphanages or other forms of residential care. In Uganda, 80% of these children have at least one living parent. Poverty, not lack of family, is the main reason for family separation. Without the resources they need, families are forced to turn to orphanages to care for their children.

Otem Collective is on a mission to reshape the way the world cares for vulnerable children—by placing families at the heart of the solution rather than relying on the residential care model. We work to **strengthen families** to care for their children and to **reunite families** by helping orphanages shift towards family-centered care.

Our Mission is to strengthen families and communities to care for vulnerable children.

Our Vision is to see a generation of Ugandan children raised in families, breaking the cycle of family separation and poverty.

Strengthening Families

Parent Support Groups

After months of relationship-building, a thorough baseline assessment, and program planning, 2024 marked a significant milestone as we launched Parent Support Groups (PSGs) in four villages in Kole District, Northern Uganda, in partnership with our Ugandan partner, AMACOD. These PSGs are designed to equip parents with the tools they need to build strong, healthy families. Through weekly meetings, parents receive training in effective parenting skills, learn about child development, and connect with others facing similar challenges. The groups provide a supportive community where parents can share experiences, encourage one another, and grow together. To further empower families, we introduced Village Savings and Loan Association (VSLA) training, preparing them to launch savings groups in early 2025. Additionally, we established a new partnership with Agrisol, a seed company, who provided PSG participants with highquality seeds and agricultural training, teaching best practices in farming to improve food security and create sustainable livelihoods. Together, these initiatives are building a brighter future for families in Kole District.

Strengthening Families

Trust-Based Relational Intervention®

Trust-Based Relational Intervention® is an attachment-based, trauma-informed intervention that is designed to meet the complex needs of vulnerable children. TBRI® is designed to help lead children who have experienced adversity, early harm, toxic stress, and/or trauma towards hope and healing. In partnership with Daniel Kaggwa of Alliance for Uganda Without Orphans, we continued Trust-Based Relational Intervention® (TBRI®) trainings around Uganda. In addition to Caregiver Trainings, we partnered with Daniel on a week-long TBRI® Children's Camp, attended by children from six districts in Uganda. Prior to the camp, the 61 camp counselors were trained in TBRI®, enabling them to implement these principles with the children. The camp was packed with brain science lessons, discussions on stress and trauma, fun games and competitions, skits to showcase learning, and of course, a campfire!

Reuniting Families

Orphanage Coaching



Providing technical support and coaching to orphanages is at the heart of our mission to ensure every children grows up in the nurturing environment of a family. It involves guiding orphanages through the complex process of transitioning from residential care to family-based care. This process includes coaching orphanage staff on critical skills such as family assessments, creating individualized care plans for each child, and identifying safe and supportive family placements. By equipping orphanage leaders with the knowledge, resources, and expertise they need, we aim to create a smooth transition where children are embraced by families that can meet their unique needs and provide the love and support they deserve.

Trained and engaged 36 residential care leaders on family-based care models and best practices in transitioning to family solutions for children.

Provided individualized coaching on family-based care to one orphanage, home to over 100 children.

Helped coach an all-day simulation training at Christian Alliance for Orphan's (CAFO) annual conference for organizations interested in transitioning to family-based care. Twenty-nine people participated in the 8-hour training.

Served as a coach for a CAFO workshop focused on taking practical first steps toward transitioning from residential care.


Began a working relationship with Catholic Care for Children in Uganda, which has 44 children's homes that want support transitioning to family-based care.










We had a 64% increase in donations this year! Thank you for giving!
